

# Pupil Premium Report 2016-17

#### Overview

The Pupil Premium was introduced in April 2011, and paid by means of a specific grant based on school census figures for pupils registered as eligible for FSM in reception to Year 11. For looked after children the Pupil Premium was calculated using the Children Looked After data returns (SSDA903). A premium has also been introduced for children whose parents are currently serving in the armed forces. This service premium is designed to address the emotional and social well-being of these pupils. The Pupil Premium is additional to main school funding and it will be used by this school to address any underlying inequalities between children eligible by ensuring that funding reaches the pupils who need it most.

Schools are free to spend the Pupil Premium as they see fit. However they will be held accountable for how they have used the additional funding to support pupils from low-income families.

#### Pupil Premium at Greenleas

- The Pupil Premium will be used to provide additional academic and/or emotional and social support to improve the progress and to raise the standard of achievement for these pupils.
- The funding will be used to close the gap between the achievement of these pupils and their peers.
- The school will use the additional funding to attempt to address any inequalities between children eligible for Pupils Premium and others.
- We will ensure that the additional funding reaches the pupils who are eligible and that it
  makes a significant impact on their education and lives.
- Pupil Premium will be clearly identifiable within the budget.
- The Head teacher in consultation with the governors and staff, will decide how the Pupil Premium is spent for the benefit of entitled pupils.
- The school will assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils based on their needs.
- The school will be accountable for how it has used the additional funding to support the
  achievement of those pupils covered by the Pupil Premium and the Head teacher will
  report to the governing body and parents on how effective the intervention has been in
  achieving its aims.
- We will continue to publish online annually information about how we have used the Premium.

#### School Policy

The Headteacher and Governing Body have agreed a policy for Pupil Premium to guide the use of funds and to ensure that is represents value for money. The policy, report and outcomes are reviewed and evaluated annually by the Governing Body

#### Accountability

The Headteacher and leadership team will regularly and rigorously monitor, evaluate and review the strategies we have put in place for Pupil Premium and report to the Governing Body on its progress and impact.

## Measuring Impact of PPG 2016-17

#### How is Progress Monitored for Pupil Premium Children?

• The 'Narrowing the Gap' initiative is very closely monitored.

Baseline assessment at the start of the initiative may include Target Tracker statements, Salford reading age, Vernon spelling age, phonics checklist, lists of key words to read or spell, EYFS assessments.

10 week programme consists of 20/30 minute sessions, up to 3 times per week.

Planned by the class teacher and delivered by a TA.

Closely monitored by a teacher.

• Close monitoring of pupils' academic progress, using Target Tracker to analyse data. Work as departments to input data, paying close attention to the progress of Pupil Premium children. Identify children who may need additional support.

# Greenleas Primary School Pupil Premium

- Regular departmental meetings to discuss the progress of Pupil Premium children.
- All teachers to complete record sheet of support individual children have received.
- Not all evaluations will focus on academic gains but on how pupils' self-confidence has developed in relation to support given.
- Close monitoring of take up in after school clubs.
- Feedback from parents in relation to family support worker input.
